KOL: THE VOICE OF TBY

July/Aug./Sept. 2019

As the midpoint of the summer approaches, so does "Pincus", the Torah portion read when my youngest daughter, Noa, was born. This Torah portion has special significance for me, not just because of Noa's birth, but also because of the story of the daughters of Zelophehad which is contained in this portion. This story is not as well-known as other biblical tales and yet it is a message that I love to share. In fact, Noa is named after one of the five daughters of Zelophehad. As my husband, Steve, always joked the other four



daughters are named Mahlah, Hoglah, Milcah, and Tirzah, and who would name a girl any of those names!

To paraphrase the story.... Zelophehad died without a male heir which meant his property and other wealth would go to cousins since women

were not allowed to inherit property.

The five daughters of Zelophehad boldly approached Moses, Eleazar the priest, the chiefs and all the congregation at the Tent of Meeting.

This was unheard of in that day and age! Women going before the male leadership to question the law of inheritance just did not happen.

The five daughters wisely made their plea to Moses.

I am sure they had butterflies in their stomachs and a tinge of fear. However, they made it clear there were no sons to inherit the father's land, and asked if they could have their father's inheritance.

Their story concludes:

"Moses brought their cause before Adonai and Adonai spoke to Moses saying: The daughters of Zelophehad speak rightly; you shall surely give them a possession of an inheritance among their father's brothers; and you shall cause the inheritance of their father to pass to them. And you shall speak to the people of Israel, saying, If a man dies, and he has no son, then you shall cause his inheritance to pass to his daughter"

Moses listened and had compassion on these women. He took this matter straight to God. And God declared: "The daughters of Zelophehad are right." (verse 6). God heard the plea of these women and then gave this statute and rule for all time to Israel: "If a man dies and has no son, then you shall transfer his inheritance to his daughter." (verse 8)

Not only do these five young women change the law of inheritance for generations to come, but God has also called their actions "*right*". Indeed, they contributed to make their society and their world a more just place to live. Furthermore, this is the only law in the entire Torah that is proposed by the people, and not God. The daughters of Zelophehad exemplify for us several important lessons, namely, having hutzpah and speaking up can change the world, and that the accepted norms and traditions in one's society must sometimes be changed. In addition, these women model for us how we should go about change and why we should be open to change, an important lesson especially because it is human nature to resist change and want to keep things the way they have always been.

The daughters of Zelophehad, by successfully initiating change, exemplify that our tradition is not set in stone. We, as Jews, are part of a continuously evolving story. Similarly, Temple Bat Yam and all communities are continuously evolving. A year ago, I became your rabbi and I brought with me different ways of observing traditions and my own style of *Continued on page 2*

teaching and preaching. Moreover, our congregational community is impacted as congregants move out of the area or pass away and new members join the community bringing with them their own vision of what a synagogue should be and do. For example, Don Hamburg introduced to Temple Bat Yam the well-received congregant's hour as part of our Yom Kippur traditions. In addition, our leadership changes every few years as new leaders step up with their own style and way of doing things.

The change brought about by the daughters of Zelophehad was however tempered by the caveat that they could only inherit property if they married into their own tribe. This restriction kept their land from leaving their tribe and causing a complete imbalance among the tribes. Similarly, any change in the congregation should flow out of the existing traditions maintaining the equilibrium of the community. For example, this past year, we maintained the early Shabbat services in the winter months, but proceeded them with the innovation of an in-depth Torah study prior to the pre-service Oneg. We also continued the popular multi-session adult education courses, but also added one session stand-alone Lunch and Learn opportunities on the third Thursday of each month. Starting in August, we are returning to a tradition many of you have expressed you have missed the last several years; the

community Havdalah celebration. We are reintroducing community Havdalah services on the second Saturday of the month sometimes in congregant's homes as in the past, but they will be interspersed with Havdalah services in community venues, and each will also have a learning component. Please join us for the first Havdalah on August 10th at the Windmill Creek Winery which will include a wine tasting, a hearty selection of hors d'oeuvres and appetizers, and a teaching on the history of kosher wine. Havdalah on September 14th will be at the home of Christine Glick and November 9th will be at Myra and Marv Novick's home. (We are skipping October due to the High Holy Days). In addition, we will be celebrating Havdalah in an exciting community venue on December 14th.

I am excited to follow the example of the daughters of Zelophehad who realized that the community's well-being sometimes depended on being open to change. I invite each of you to share with me changes, innovations, and areas of growth you would like to see in the coming year as well as letting me know what Temple Bat Yam traditions you cherish. In Deuteronomy 1:6-8 we read "Adonai, our God said to us in Horeb, 'You have stayed long enough at this mountain. Turn and take your journey". As I begin my second year as your rabbi, I look forward to continuing to journey together with each of you.

Membership

As I mentioned at our Annual Meeting this past June, a member of the Temple had sat next to me at a TBY dinner and said: "I heard that a number of Temple members left and we're down from last year." The short answer of mine was "yes we are." The overall number of members, including our Friends, was 158 the beginning of June, compared to 173 a year earlier – a decline of 9 ½ percent. More specifically, the number of our Full Time members, Associate Members, and participants in our Gift of Membership program was 122, compared to 132 a year earlier. Our Friends numbered 36, compared to 41 a year earlier.

As we look at our membership numbers, it is important to keep a perspective that involves more than just looking at one number, or one year's experience. Our early June overall number of 158 represents 15 more than the 143 recorded at the end of Fiscal Year 2016. Last year's 173 was our highest overall in recent memory, however, it was only 6 higher than the preceding year.

The reasons for movement in these numbers are multiple. On the downside, these include people moving out of the area or selling their seasonal property here, leaving after a life cycle event such as a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, switching from itemized income tax deductions to standard deduction (a development that has had adverse effects among a number of charitable organizations this past year), illness or death among congregants, etc. Influencing the upside, meanwhile, the influx of new members may be lower owing to less people moving here as their new primary residence, or due to persons not willing or are unable to drive longer distances in some instance, etc. Between 2016 and 2017, for example, we experienced a sharp overall increase in membership (from 143 to 167), a development largely fueled by a marked increase among congregants having a property in nearby Delaware. Our current membership includes over 40 families or singles from that area.

Our vibrancy continues as a result of volunteer efforts by both older and newer members. It is important for all of us to be on the lookout for new members as TBY transitions over time. When I look at our volunteers, I see that many of them have just been with us for 7 or less years. That includes 2 of our 7 trustees; the President of our Sisterhood and a number of its officers; the Co-Chair of the Sidney Eagle Men's Club; our New Newsletter Editor; our Webmaster; our Premier Baker of Cakes; our Tarot Card Reader at special events; our Golf Tournament participants last year; and the tallest members of our Library Faculty.

Our Board of Directors recently decided to continue both our Gift of Membership and Friends Programs. In closing, I ask each of you to bring into our TBY Family one or more new members this current fiscal year. We are at the beginning of the best part of the year to accomplish that goal. Thank you.

Situational Awareness

The area we live in has a low crime rate. However, there are people out there looking to break into cars, grab purses and steal anything of value to buy drugs. The opioid crisis is alive and well on the Eastern Shore. Take a few extra seconds and be aware of other cars in the parking lot or people just "hanging around". Always lock your car doors. Never leave keys or packages in your car.

Situational Awareness is a learned trait. You must train yourself to be more aware of where you are at all times. A little extra caution is all I'm talking about. Stay safe!
