



From the Rabbi's Desk

It may seem hard to believe but I have served as your rabbi for a year. In the immortal words of Mayor Ed Koch, I am tempted to ask, "How am I doing?" But I will restrain myself. In all studies of human behavior and psychology, it always amazes me how much our self-perception differs from that of others around us, especially those closest to us. In many cases of



psychological evaluation and in counseling, the true test or proof of a given condition or syndrome comes not from your own personal self-assessment but from that of your good friends, your spouse and your family members. So often, without realizing it, we are unable to see ourselves as we

truly are and instead we concoct a false idea and believe it wholeheartedly. We think we are looking in a mirror that reflects our genuine selves and yet we have distorted the mirror and do not see the true picture.

This can happen on an individual level, often revolving around body images, and it can happen collectively with families, communities and societies. As we very well know, truth or our apprehension of truth is based very strongly on perception. If our perception is faulty, then what we believe to be true is faulty.

A few weeks ago, our Torah portion talked about the 12 Israelites who were sent into the land of Canaan to reconnoiter and to see the land's strengths and weaknesses and that of its inhabitants as well. All of the "spies" reported on the beauty and fertility and richness of the land but 10 of those 12 fomented rebellion and fear when they reported on the huge nature of the inhabitants claiming that they were

members of a race of giants. They spread fear and concern among all the people even though Joshua and Caleb pleaded with the people to trust in God and that God would guarantee their success. God ultimately punishes the people by forcing them to remain in the wilderness an additional 38 years; allowing that generation to die in the Sinai desert and letting their children be the generation that enters the Promised Land.

Many rabbis have had a hard time with God's harsh sentence of collective capital punishment for those who believed the fear mongers. In the 6th century Midrash known as Midrash Rabbah, the rabbis lay out the true crime which the spies and the people committed. Our rabbis taught us, "When the spies said, 'And we were in our own sight as grasshoppers,' God stated, 'I will forgive them this remark.' But when they went on to say, 'And so we must have appeared to them,' God became infuriated, questioning how could they possibly know how they appeared to the Canaanites." The lesson we are taught is that we cannot presume to know how we appear to others. Even if we look in a mirror, we cannot see how we truly appear to others.

Whether as individuals, as a family, as a congregation, and as a community, we cannot determine our actions based on a self-image that may be inaccurate. Others will judge us for what we do and say and that is fine. Hopefully, they will honestly tell us how they view us and appreciate what we have said and done. But even if they do not, we must not presume to know their perception. We need to do and be the best that we can. And at the end of the day, the week, the month or the year, let us judge ourselves honestly and truthfully based on our values, our observances, and our highest ideals. But if we really need to know how others see us, we can always ask them, "How am I doing?"

President's Report

25th Anniversary of the Temple Bat Yam Building!

Twenty-five years ago the TBY building was opened and dedicated. The cornerstone reads *September 1997*. It was the gem of our Jewish community. We had a place to pray together, a place to Bar/Bat Mitzvah our children, a place for marriages to take place, a place for us to celebrate together and cry together when there was a loss. My husband and I have no family on the Eastern Shore, so as a result, Temple Bat Yam became our surrogate family. We joined when the Temple was in its first year of existence. We were thrilled to have a Jewish community around us in such a beautiful building.

Well, as you know the years pass and we all don't look the same as we did 25 years ago ... certainly I don't. The interior of the building needs attention. Bette Bohlmann and Stu Smolins presented to the Board the idea of a celebration and drive to refurbish the interior of the building. It was unanimously approved. Great idea! At this time the committee consists of the following: Bette and Stu are the chairpersons, Jay Taustin, Anita and Steve Winkler, Sandy Abrams, Rabbi Rutberg and myself. More people will be brought in as needed. (As an aside the roof was replaced the week of June 13th. It looks great and I don't have to worry about leaks for another 25 years!)

This will be a year long celebration and drive. We will start with refurbishing the sanctuary (painting, carpet, and so forth) and move on to other areas as funds become available. Through a donation the sound system was replaced so we could use Zoom, and a new computer was purchased. We already have a pledge to replace the windows in the memorial alcove with stained glass and back lighting. Won't that be a wonderful addition to the sanctuary! Actually, we have donations and pledges for about \$10,000.00 already and we are just getting started. As an added incentive, anyone that donates \$2,500 or more will get a brass plate with their name on the boards in the foyer. Barbara Patrick designed and had created a large thermometer that is in the foyer so that everyone can see our donations growing and growing.

In October (we don't have an exact date yet) we will have a Bang Up Celebration at the Taustin property Blu. There will be silent auctions and bidding on baskets. Of course, there will be food and some drinks. We are after all celebrating at a Taustin property! The Winklers have put together events such as this before and they are in full swing to make it memorable. But that is not the end of our monetary drive. It will last the better part of a year. Hopefully, everyone will be donating either goods or cash to help us reach our goal of \$100,000. Also, I put our Tzedakah box back in the foyer. Please throw in your change or a few dollars when you pass by. I peeked in last week and people are actually doing just that. Every little bit helps and adds up.

So, now you know what the plan is ... we would like to get our beloved Temple all spruced up. Now that the roof is sound we can look forward to improving the interior. Please consider a generous donation for the cause.

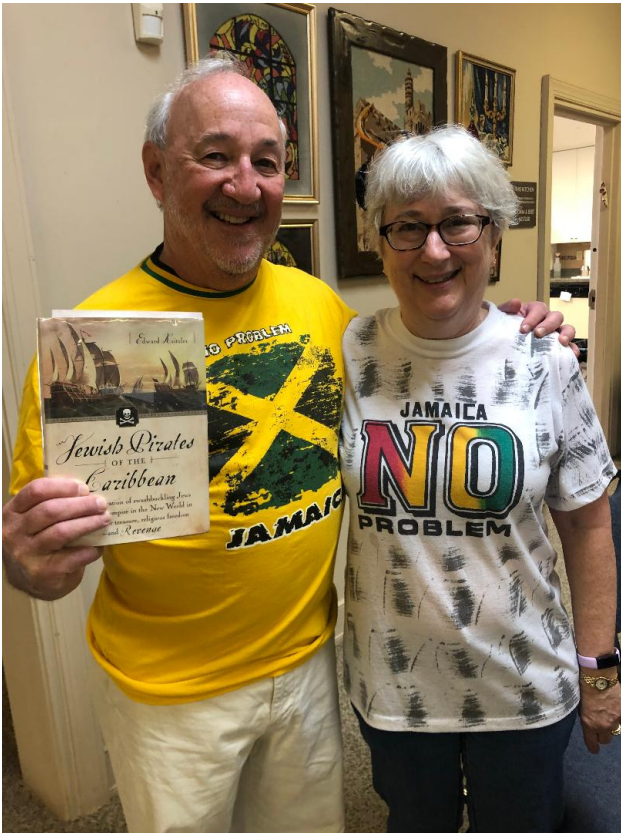

Bagels and Books

Jewish Pirates? Really?



Did you know that there were Jewish pirates? The 20 people who attended “Bagels & Books” on June 26 had a lively discussion of the book **Jewish Pirates of the Caribbean: How a Generation of Swashbuckling Jews Carved Out an Empire in the New World in Their Quest for Treasure, Religious Freedom—and Revenge** by Edward Kritzer. It was particularly interesting because it reconnected us with Conversos (Jews who publicly recanted the Jewish faith and adopted Christianity under the pressure of the Spanish Inquisition, Merriam-Webster dictionary) which was the topic of the year’s first book from last summer.

Joan and Syl Sobel did a terrific job as discussion leaders. They distributed a list of questions for our group to think about and react to. For example, “Christopher Columbus- member of the Tribe or not?” “Were you familiar with any of this history about Jews in the New World? If so, where did you learn about it?” The questions were particularly helpful for several reasons: 1. The questions focused the discussion; 2. The questions helped guide the reading of the book which several people had found

difficult, and 3. People who hadn’t had a chance to read the book were still able to participate based on their own prior knowledge. Joan and Syl also initiated the use of technology by showing clips of an interview with the author who is now deceased.

The next meeting of Bagels & Books will be Sunday, September 18 at noon in the Social Hall. The title of the book will be forthcoming.

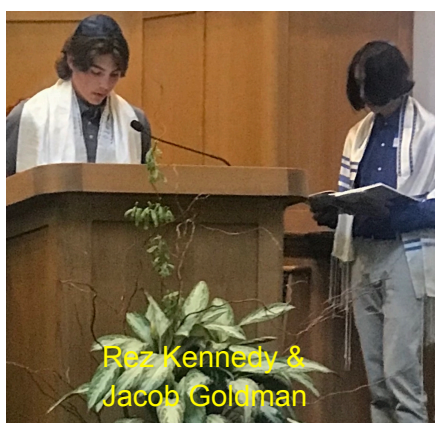
Religious School Confirmation

On April 29, 2022, the Sydney Eagle Memorial Men's Club of Temple Bat Yam presented an awe-inspiring Annual Yom Hashoah program that consisted of a somber and moving Yom Hashoah service commemorating the victims of the Holocaust. A special live music program was also presented. Susan Zimmer, Lecturer of Music at Salisbury University, who assisted with the Yom Kippur service this past year, agreed to perform musical selections for this program along with two of her colleagues. Susan Zimmer played the piano; Jeff Schoyen, Cello Professor and Orchestra Conductor at Salisbury University, played cello; and John Allen presented on vocals.

Susan performed the "Tango of Death," a piano solo. This piece was performed by the prisoners' orchestra at the Janowska concentration camp.

The title of the second song was "There's No Life Like Life at Auschwitz." This was performed by Susan on piano and Jeff on cello.

The third song presented was "We Remember Them," a memorial song composed in 1999. This was preceded by a reading about how music saved the life of

Holocaust prisoners, presented by John. Susan played piano, Jeff played cello, and John performed on vocals.

We would like to convey our deepest appreciation to Susan, Jeff and John for presenting an extremely moving and meaningful program. We would also like to thank our gifted rabbi, Rabbi Rutberg, for helping compose and lead the service, in addition to Phyllis Alpern for leading the service with the Rabbi, and for her musical leadership at the Temple for many years. We would like to express our thanks to June Todd for playing the piano during the service, an expert performance, as usual!

Membership Committee

Our overall number of Temple membership units, including our Friends, numbered 153 at the end of June 2022, compared to 156 at the end of June 2021. The 153 consisted of: 47 full time single members; 58 full time family members; 6 associate single members; 5 associate family members; and 37 Friends. The overall decline of 3 was accounted for by a drop in full time single members from 50 to 47. Among full time family members, 8 members left Temple Bat Yam (TBY) and 8 new members joined. Regarding our Friends, 4 participants left our Temple and 4 new Friends joined. The number of associate single and family members was unchanged.

The Gift of Membership Campaign was launched nearly 10 years ago in 2014, while the Friends membership program was adopted by the TBY Board in May 2015. Both have been very successful in adding to our membership. Although both are continuing, it is important to note that the annual fee for the Friends program is now \$275 for those participating for the first time as of July 1, 2022. The annual fee for existing Friends has not been changed. It is also worth noting that new Associate membership has not been offered for a number of years as the Board decided to replace the Associate membership category with the Friend program. Existing Associates continue to be “grandfathered in.”

In November 2021, Rabbi Rutberg led a Shabbat service that recognized and honored new members who joined TBY in the preceding two years. Please mark your calendars as a similar Shabbat service for new members has been scheduled for October 28, 2022.

Our current Membership Committee, co-chaired by Paul (Selbyville, DE) and Doreen (Dagsboro, DE), consists of Steve Winkler and Harlan Eagle (Salisbury MD), Barbara Garber and Fran Bledsoe (Millsboro, Delaware), and Sylvan and Joan Sobel (Potomac, MD with a second home in Ocean Pines, MD.) Other congregants involved with membership-related matters include Ellen Eanet, Bette Bohlmann, Tim Rucinski, and David Fox.

We end this update with a few important requests.

- First, we ask that congregants, including but not limited to membership committee participants, volunteer to serve as greeters at Shabbat services. We cannot underestimate the value of welcoming existing and, yes, potential new members coming to our services. Please contact Doreen at timdoreen@verizon.net if you wish to volunteer.
- Second, we ask that each congregant bring into our TBY Family one or more new members this current fiscal year. As we look at it, all congregants are extensions of our committee. We are at the beginning of the best part of the year to accomplish that goal. What is Temple Bat Yam's unique link?

What does my unique link do?

When customers click on TBY's unique link, they skip the process to search for a charity to support among over 1 million eligible charities. Instead, they're taken to smile.amazon.com and are automatically asked if they want to support Temple Bat Yam.

Can I just tell supporters to search for Temple Bat Yam at smile.amazon.com?

Yes. However, that makes it harder for your supporters to find and select TBY. There are over 1 million eligible charities, and customers may end up picking a different organization during the selection process. Sharing our charity link increases the likelihood that customers will select TBY before they start shopping.

Do supporters have to click on Temple Bat Yam's AmazonSmile link every time they shop?

No. Once customers select your organization, TBY will receive 0.5% of the price of all their eligible smile.amazon.com purchases, regardless of whether they use TBY's unique AmazonSmile link to return to the site. However, we recommend that supporters bookmark and use your link so they don't accidentally shop at www.amazon.com instead of smile.amazon.com. Only purchases made at smile.amazon.com are eligible for donations.

What do customers that have already selected a charity see when they click on TBY's unique link?

If someone is already supporting TBY and they click on our unique link, they will simply be taken to smile.amazon.com so they can start shopping. They do not have to re-select your charity. If someone supporting a different charity clicks on your charity link, they are asked if they'd like to switch to support TBY.
