



## From the Rabbi's Desk

For many years, the American Jewish community has judged the qualifications of a candidate for the U.S. presidency on whether he or she will be good for the Jews. Since the 1970's, the question has been usually framed by asking if this candidate will be good for the State of Israel. During my sophomore year in college I heard a talk given by Al Vorspan, then the leading Reform Jewish activist of civil



rights and social justice. He told us about attending a recent gathering of Democratic Presidential hopefuls addressing a Jewish audience. Al Vorspan said that if he closed his eyes and listened to the candidates' answers about how they will treat the Jewish State of Israel, the one who promised

the greatest support for Israel was George Wallace.

In the months before the 2016 election, a congregant asked me a similar question about which candidate I thought would be the best for Israel. I was taken aback by the question. It seemed so outdated. It would be unthinkable for any present-day American presidential candidate to advocate a change in the U.S. support for Israel regardless of how they may feel about Jews or the American Jewish community. Not only is Israel our ally and many of the Arab states are supported by Russia or Iran, but more importantly, Israel is the only truly democratic country in the Middle East.

Since the Israeli election in November, the fifth one in three years, some doubts were emerging if Israel was leaving its democratic legacy behind on the trash heap of history. This ultra-right and hyper nationalist government that was cobbled together to bring Netanyahu back to power as Prime Minister and prevent him from prosecution for his illegal acts of corruption was moving closer and closer to

making Israel into a non-democratic state. Foremost in these anti-democratic activities was the attempt to pass laws that severely weaken the Israeli Supreme Court and therefore the checks and balances on the other branches of government that are the hallmark of a democracy.

A couple of weeks before I wrote this article, Israel went through a very scary time when it almost seemed on the precipice of collapse. Not because of an external threat, although that is constantly present, but due to the internal threat caused by these undemocratic changes that the government tried to institute. Yet the people of Israel proved who they are to the world and did not succumb to the wishes of Bibi and Ben Gvir. They blocked the highways. They shut down the airport. They stood their ground and by their actions they told the world, "This is what democracy looks like!"

Daniel Gordis, a rabbi, author and political analyst, wrote an excellent article on March 27 proclaiming that we "just witnessed one of the greatest weeks in Israeli history". What we saw proudly displayed was a love of country and a devotion to the Zionist ideal, people from the left, the center, and some even from the right coming together for massive protests free from looting or violence to defend, protect and preserve the democratic Jewish State of Israel.

And so, on Israel's Independence Day that comes at the end of this month, when we celebrate Israel's 75 years, we can celebrate it proudly not only as our only Jewish state, our only homeland and place of refuge, but as the only truly democratic state in the Middle East where the rule of law and justice reigns supreme, where the rights of the citizens are protected, and where all have a say in the present and future of our country. It will be a day of pride, a day of thanksgiving, a day of healing and a day of hope.

May it be God's will that Israel heals its wounds and division, strengthens its democracy, and thrives long into the future going from strength to strength to strength.

The fish felt no more pain. Needless to say, I didn't eat gefilte fish that Passover, and every year I think about Bubby and the fish in the bathtub. I'm not a big fan of any fish to this day.

The next night we had a lovely Seder and I enjoyed being with the family and not eating gefilte fish.

So, by now you are asking yourself why am I telling you this story. Right? Well, I hope you had memorable Passover dinners over the years. I hope you still enjoy your family, if possible, and friends over our Jewish tradition of retelling the Passover story. There is nothing better than family, friends and our Jewish traditions. Boy, I really like matzah!

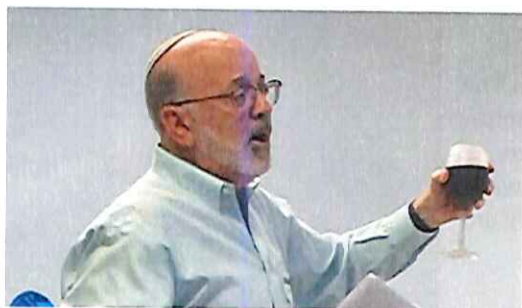
