## From the Rabbi's Desk

"Summertime and the livin' is easy..." so wrote two nice Jewish boys, George and Ira, about the "hazy, lazy, crazy days of summer." I can't say if the fish are jumpin' or if the cotton is high but I would agree with the easy-living ways of summer. It is the perfect time for kicking back, putting up your feet, feeling the sun on your face and listening to good music. As we move



through the halcyon days of this season, we realize that summer can't only be about fun like it was when we were kids; summer also has to be a time of preparation for the coming new year and for new Temple programming.

Oftentimes people say that the holidays are coming late or coming early each year. Logically we know that in truth they come at the same time every year on the Hebrew (lunar) calendar. The perception that they come late or early on any given year is due to their juxtaposition with the dates on the civil (solar) calendar. This year (2023) the High Holidays start on the evening of Friday September 15 with Rosh Hashanah, the first day of the New Year of 5784. Regardless of whether we consider that an early start or a late start to the Jewish High Holydays, come they will. Therefore on a personal and on an institutional basis, we need to be properly prepared. On the personal level, it is never too soon to repent. In fact, one famous rabbi taught us that we should repent one day before our death and since we never know when that fateful day might come, we should make repentance and self-reflection a daily practice. And with all the various variables and moving parts that make up our High Holyday services and celebrations here at Temple Bat Yam, the sooner we begin to prepare, the better.

But I would also like to use this summer as a chance to start something new. A number of congregants have asked me about starting a Saturday morning Shabbat activity. Some have suggested Saturday morning Shabbat services. Others have said, "Yeah, that was tried before but it always kind of fizzled out." I want to use a different or more cautious approach by starting with Torah study. What this simply means is gathering for a class on Saturday mornings at 10 to study the Torah portion for that Shabbat. We have recently purchased ten Modern Torah Commentaries for this purpose. The books contain the traditional Hebrew text along with a contemporary English translation and commentaries from a variety of modern as well as medieval and early rabbinic sources such as Rashi, Talmud and Midrash. Feel free to bring your own Humashim or Commentaries as well. It is recommended but not required that you review the Torah portion and some of its commentaries before class to contribute to the discussion. If our group grows to 10 or more frequent participants, we can consider expanding our Saturday morning program to include a regular Shabbat morning service.

This Saturday morning Torah Study class will start **Saturday July 22<sup>nd</sup> at 10am** as we begin the reading of the last (really the first) book of the Torah, Deuteronomy.

So as we sit on our decks or on our boats or on our chairs by the beach enjoying the sun, sea and sand, relaxing in the warmth and enjoying the freedom of the season, let us not forget that summer, like all good things, must come to an end and force ourselves to look ahead to the coming year of Jewish living and learning and expressing our Jewish spirituality through prayer and song and celebration at Temple Bat Yam.

# Membership Committee

Our overall number of Temple membership units, including our Friends, numbered 149 at the end of June 2023. The 149 total consists of 48 full-time single members; 56 full-time family members; 6 associate single members; 4 associate family members; and 35 Friends.

The Gift of Membership program and the Friends membership program continue. Both have been very successful in adding to our membership. The annual fee for the Friends program is now \$275 for those participating for the first time as of July 1, 2022. The annual fee for existing Friends has remained the same. The Associate Membership is no longer being offered to new congregants.

On October 27th, Rabbi Rutberg will lead a Shabbat service that recognizes and honors new members who joined TBY the preceding year. Please mark your calendars for this special event. We are in the process of developing a survey to be sent out to the membership and, in the Fall, will be working on reaching out more to younger people in the Salisbury area and elsewhere to get the word out about our community here in Ocean City/Berlin.

Our current Membership Committee, chaired by Doreen Linehan (Dagsboro, DE) and Vice Chair Cindy Brown (Salisbury), consists of Steve Winkler and Anna Solomon (Salisbury MD), Barbara Garber and Fran Bledsoe (Millsboro, Delaware), Terri Broemm (Ocean Pines), Ed Wirkman (Berlin, MD), Paul Schwab (West Fenwick), Shelley Klapholz (Ocean Pines) and Sylvan and Joan Sobel (Potomac, MD with a second home in Ocean Pines, MD.) Other congregants are involved with membership-related matters, mostly helping out by being Greeters on Friday nights. We are introducing a brand new program called TBY Guides where new congregants will be paired with committee members or other long-term members to ease the transition to new membership. Anyone interested in being a TBY Guide may contact Doreen for more information.

We ask that congregants volunteer to serve as greeters at Shabbat services. It is important to welcome existing and potential new members coming to our services. # Bagels and Books

Our end-of-the-year selection for Bagels & Books was Looking for Lost Bird, a memoir written by Yvette Melanson with Claire Safran. Yvette, a child who was adopted into a Jewish family, describes her search as an adult for her Navajo roots. The book discussion was led by Tim and Doreen Linehan who talked about facts related to the adoption of native American children. For example, native American parents were often told that their child was born with an illness and had been taken to a hospital for treatment. The fact was that the child was healthy and whisked away to an adoption agency where others were waiting to adopt children. We also discussed what we learned about the Navajo traditions and the similarities with Jewish customs. Some participants were concerned about the accuracy in the book, so Tim highlighted the characteristics of a memoir vs. non-fiction books vs. historical fiction.

Tim is a published author who we first met when he came to Temple Bat Yam to discuss his research which resulted in the book, Hannah Gould. Hannah is a 15-year-old girl whose Jewish family is murdered during 1942 in Poland. She escapes and joins the partisans in their fight against the Nazis. Tim is currently working on another book which we'll look forward to reading. Doreen is an active member of the Library Committee and was recently appointed as the chair of the Membership Committee at TBY.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Sunday, October 8, at noon. Rabbi Rutberg will lead the discussion of People Love Dead Jews by Dara Horn. Copies of the book will be available in the library soon.


